G. W. Survives Nitro Scare

George Washington built a 20-point lead and withstood a furious rally by Nitro to gain a 20-18 high school football victory Saturday at Underwood Field.

Nitro rode the passing of Duane Snyder for three fourth-quarter touchdowns to scare the undefeated Patriots, second rated in Class AAA.

Snyder went to work following George Washington's final touchdown with 5:14 left in the third period. He guided the Wildcats 64 yards in 11 plays, capping the drive himself with an eight-yard run on the first play of the fourth quarter. Nitro capitalized on a G. W. fumble when David Stalnaker recovered on the Patriots' 22. Six plays later Nitro had its second touchdown on a six-yard pass from Snyder to Donnie Mellert. Mellert and Tim Westfall then

blocked a punt and Nitro recovered on the G. W. 24 as things continued to break for the Wildcats. The opportunistic Wildcats took advantage of this break and scored again when Snyder

connected with Gene Duffield from five yards out. Nitro then failed for the third time of the exciting game to make a two-point conversion when Snyder's pass fell incomplete.

G. W.'s deciding two points came after its second touchdown on a busted play that Mike Estes turned into a long pass of about 35 yards to Bill Tate in the end zone. G. W. lined up to attempt to kick the point, but the center snap sailed over the head of the holder. Estes ran down the ball and threw the desperation completion.

pass to Edwards. David Coleman's interception set up the T. D. The Patriots made it 20-0 on Vanhoose's one-yard run, climaxing an 80-yard drive in the third quarter. "I'm happy to be undefeated," G. W. coach Steve Edwards said. "Nitro played a hell of a game. I'm glad to get out of here with a win."

Nitro coach Pat Vance had praise for his defensive unit and the sparkling leadership of Snyder. The outcome sets the stage for a Friday night battle of unbeaten between G. W. and Herbert Hoover. Nitro is 3-5.

Stonewall Escapes S.C. Defense, 6-3

Adolph Johnson dash 52 yards for a touchdown on Stonewall Jackson's sixth offensive play of the game and the Generals made it stand for a 6-3 victory over a surprisingly strong South Charleston team Saturday night at Oakes Field.

South Charleston, led by the brilliant play of George Brown and Tom McMillion, continually put down Stonewall threats with super defensive plays. In addition to making several key tackles, Brown recovered a fumble deep in South Charleston territory and McMillion intercepted a pass.

Stonewall clearly won the battle of statistics, but when South Charleston needed the big defensive play, the Black Eagles got it from either Brown, McMillion or big Kevin Snodgrass, who blocked a Stonewall field goal attempt in the second half.

Johnson's 52-yard touchdown came with 8:35 still remaining in the first half and the Generals were marching for another score in the period before

Brown ended the threat by recovering Eddie Ray Dyess' fumble at the 27. The only scoring from South Charleston came from Jeff Mallory, who booted a 29-yard field goal with just 13 seconds left in the second half. That made it 6-3 at the half.

Stonewall stayed in South Charleston's back yard in the third quarter. The Generals moved to the 10-yard line where Dyess tried a 28-yard field goal. Snodgrass, a 210-pound senior tackle, busted through the line and blocked the kick.

Minutes later, Stonewall had the ball again as South Charleston's Doug Kovach fumbled and Stonewall's Kevin Fletcher recovered at the 24.

Stonewall moved to the four-yard line, but McMillion and Brown teamed to throw the Generals all the way back to the 14 to end that threat. Johnson was the game's leading rusher with 141 yards in 16 carries. Stonewall, as a team, gained 292 yards rushing.

Donnie Dent led the Black Eagles' attack with 61 yards with Kovach accounting for 57. Mark Grandon, starting for the first time for the injured Greg Young, played well under fire and hit on four of eleven attempts for 64 yards.
